

1st SDG: End poverty in all its forms everywhere

ENGIE internal NGOs (Energy Assistance) works to provide access to one of the basic services which is energy. They bring lighting and electricity from renewable sources to isolated populations which are distant from any network.

Beneficiaries are opened to new technologies; they benefit of a bigger security at night and have the necessary energy to the development of economic activities and to vital needs (cooking and education).

For instance, since 2014, ENGIE's Foundation funds the Samu social's actions in Paris for the benefit of people in extreme poverty to allow them to find a decent place of accommodation and to offer them a medical and social support.

In addition, ENGIE's Foundation finances projects of Positive Planet Foundation which intervenes to empower the most vulnerable populations, especially in the poorest rural areas.

TARGET:

1.4 - By 2030, ensure that all men and women, in particular the poor and the vulnerable, have equal rights to economic resources, as well as access to basic services, ownership and control over land and other forms of property, inheritance, natural resources, appropriate new technology and financial services, including microfinance



2nd SDG: End hunger, achieve food security and improved nutrition and promote sustainable agriculture

ENGIE contributes to this objective through its Foundation and internal NGOs (Energy Assistance) that help by giving affordable and reliable energy to isolated and poor populations.

For instance, Energy Assistance has partnered in 2018 the French-Dutch association "Sector 10", that fights hunger in Africa, to enhance the reliability of the drying of spirulina algae produced by a Kenyan farm. Spirulina is very rich in vitamins, minerals, proteins and other nutrients: 5 grams per day, for a few weeks, is enough to rehabilitate any child suffering from severe malnutrition.

In 2022, 3 WKS inverters of 5kVA each, 10 Lithium batteries of 2.4 kWh as well as 36 panels of 320 Wp have been installed and allow the spirulina farm to be energy independent.

TARGET:

2.1 - By 2030, end hunger and ensure access by all people, in particular the poor and people in vulnerable situations, including infants, to safe, nutritious and sufficient food all year round



4th SDG: Ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all

ENGIE's Foundation and the internal NGOs (Energy Assistance) lead or finance access to energy humanitarian projects which promote education and care for children and adults. These projects concern especially schools' electrification and maintenance since pre-school to higher education, and formation centers for adults that may be formed during the day or throughout night classes.

For instance, since 2015, ENGIE's Foundation has financed Schools, Lights and Rights project which is structured around three axes:

- Schools: schools electrification or reception centers;
- Lights: distribution of portable solar lamps;
- Rights: distribution of a civil status to children, prerequisite and indispensable to give them access to school, health and legal protection.

TARGET:

4.4 - By 2030, substantially increase the number of youth and adults who have relevant skills, including technical and vocational skills, for employment, decent jobs and entrepreneurship
